Experiencing the London Stage: A Survey of British Theatre While Studying Abroad:

Project Summary

This Spring, I will be studying abroad at a conservatory program in London with the help of a 3rd year Miller Arts Award. I was recently accepted to both the London Academy of Dramatic Arts' Classical Semester Program and NYU's Shakespeare in Performance Program through the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art. Currently, I am planning on attending NYU's program, but I am keeping my options open because NYU had to cancel their Fall 2020 program and LAMDA stayed open this semester despite Covid-19. I am beyond ecstatic to be studying acting in a new country and I want to make the most of my time across the pond. I hope to broaden both my artistic and cultural horizons and would love the opportunity to experience great performance while studying in one of the world's most theatrical cities. Getting to see productions on the West End and beyond would be both academically and personally rewarding. I will be at NYU's program from January to May or LAMDA's program from January to April, so there are many opportunities for a trip to a stage. There are two ways that I can use the \$500 to see theatre while studying abroad; taking a NYU course or creating my own personal season.

Proposal

1. NYU "Theatre in London" Course

The NYU program consists of one 8 credit course at RADA that encompasses all of the theatrical training. I will pick two additional elective courses from a list of four. One of those courses is "ITHEA-UT 662:Theatre in London" which takes students to a wide variety of productions. The course costs \$510, and enrollment is on a first come, first serve basis. The course description is provided by NYU's website:

"A selection of theatrical productions is chosen to give students a feel for the breadth and depth of London theatre during weekly theatre visits to the West End and fringe theatres. Each production is viewed and analyzed as a whole, but the many and varied elements that go into making London theatre supply a different focus each week. In addition, there are occasional field trips to sites of theatrical interest with a guest speaker or two thrown into the mix each semester to discuss his/her work (from writing to directing to acting to designing), to share knowledge and expertise and to help demonstrate how high-quality parts are needed to make a high-quality whole."

2. Crafting my own experience

If I am unable to get into ITHEA-UT 662 or I attend LAMDA instead (which does not offer a similar class) I have created my own season of theatre that would be intellectually and personally enriching. I want to sample many different genres and forms and focus on British culture and theatre. I will be seeing a Shakespeare comedy (*Measure for Measure*), a Shakespeare Tragedy (*Hamlet*), a dramatic contemporary play (*The Ocean at the End of the Lane*), a comedic contemporary play (*Magic Goes Wrong*), and an iconic mystery play that has

the longest run of any play in West End history (*Agatha Christie's "The Mousetrap"*). It is important to my performance education to see at least two Shakespeare productions and to mostly see plays, not musicals. Although I love to perform and watch musical theatre, my area of artistic study is on straight plays and Shakespeare performance. In addition, the majority of the musicals shown in London are Broadway transfers, which would not give me an authentic British experience, hence why I chose *Back to the Future* as it originated on the West End. *Moulin Rouge!* is my one indulgence of American origin.

This list may change as more plays with shorter runs are announced for the Spring season, and depending on my class schedule and what tickets are available, I may be able to add more productions and buy cheaper tickets. Based on current estimations, it would cost \$505.17 to see seven productions at various venues.
