
## Miller Fourth-Year Arts Award: Outcome Report Hollywood Narrative Paintings

## **JACKSON**

I'm making paintings of the entertainment industry, highlighting the intrigue of the business, its personalities, lifestyle, traditions, and content, while also critiquing its celebration of celebrity and its monstrosity. The paintings depict different narratives: the glamorous and grotesque red carpet parade, the spectacle and magic of being on-set, the anxiety and serial nature of actors and talent at the audition, the producer reading a script by the pool, the absurdity of a Hollywood house party, the award show, and the movie theater experience. These paintings also comment on the business's cruelty, idealization, and creation of stars through an eccentric rendering of figures and painterly handling of material. Formally, the works are full of light and color. The style is representational, yet loose and more abstract. The compositions are invented from scratch and aim to be dynamic and filled with energy, complexity, and pockets of drama that invite the viewer to examine the scene, while also enjoying the work from afar.

My influences are James Ensor, Henri Lautrec, George Bellows, Edward Hopper, and Eric Fischl. I admire artists who paint odd narrative scenes filled with brilliant color and energetic brushwork.
