Semester Studying English Literature at the University of Oxford

I. Proposal

I will be spending next semester as a visiting student at Hertford College in the University of Oxford, and I am thrilled for this opportunity to cultivate both my analytical prose and my understanding of English literature, criticism, and theory.

In my application statement, I cited I. A. Richards as being one of the primary thinkers who set off my interest in poetic criticism. His work struck me, and I was amazed that I'd never even heard his name, nor the names of many other seminal critics, before taking a chance poetics course in my fourth semester at UVa. Richards' *Practical Criticism* is credited with inaugurating the practice of "close reading," yet the very idea of close reading as a method with origins — as a practice of reading poetry that is anything other than the perfect standard — had gone mostly unaddressed in the whole of my (otherwise excellent) English curriculum. I wanted to go to a place where I could ask directly and investigate deeply the questions I have about how we think about poetry, and the tutorial system at Oxford — in which students read and work largely independently, writing essays on a weekly and biweekly basis — offers precisely that possibility.

As such, my written "product" from my time abroad will be twofold: essays on poetry and poetics produced within my studies, and poems produced outside of my studies. I plan on writing these poems with an eye towards my Area Program in Poetry Writing capstone project, a 40 to 50 page manuscript that I will be assembling (ENCW 4920) the spring I return. Naturally, I anticipate these poems being strengthened by my coursework — which will very likely focus on early twentieth century modernism, an era I've become increasingly drawn to — not to mention new and exciting circumstances, and the museums, archives, and historical sites I may want to fold into my manuscript's "narrative."*

Professor Brad Pasanek, my project mentor, was the natural choice to support this experience: not only did he provide feedback on my application, but he also pointed me towards the work of Hertford tutors and lecturers relevant to our joint interest in the digital humanities. He also possesses an abiding research interest in poetry and poetics spanning centuries and disciplines — thus, I felt that his mentorship *combined* with the creative writing mentorship already built into the APPW would be most valuable for this opportunity, given that I aim to build my critical prose and research skills as well as creative work.

Because the program cost is significantly more than the cost of attendance at UVa, I am requesting the full \$3000 award amount, as detailed below. I sincerely thank the Miller Arts committee for the consideration of my proposal.

* The following are more specific details regarding goals for my poetry "product." First, I expect to write around 15 new poems total; that is, approximately one new poem per week — a pace I am comfortable with after having taken a number of creative writing workshops at UVa with comparable output. Second, the final form of the work will most likely be electronic, though I also intend on keeping a journal/sketchbook with notes and impressions. Both I will be happy to share at the April outcome presentation (see schedule below) in addition to my overall experience. Finally, ekphrasis — or writing after visual art — has been an important part of my process for a while now; some museums I am looking forward to "writing after" include the Ashmolean Museum, the Victoria and Albert Museum, and London's National Gallery.

III. Budget

Budget Notes:

- The "Study Abroad Itemized Costs" are based on my "Education Abroad Expenses Form," which has already been approved by UVa Study Abroad. These same costs may also be found on the program website under "Dates and Fees" (an image is also pasted at the end of this proposal — the "Transportation to and from Airports" is the only line item added specifically by UVa).

- <u>IFSA State School Grant</u>: IFSA-Butler (the institution through which this program is arranged) offers a \$2000 scholarship automatically to all students attending a state school, of which UVa is one.
- UVa ISO Scholarship: I am grateful to have applied for and received a \$2000 scholarship from UVa ISO to be used towards the funding of this experience. I have informed the coordinator of this scholarship of my intention to apply for this Miller Arts Award, and they assured me that they do not expect any conflict on their end.
- "TOTAL ESTIMATED COST TOTAL AWARDS": This would be the amount supplied by my own contributions.
- These tuition and fees, including flight tickets, have not yet been paid and will very likely be paid late in the summer, in August or early September, in accordance with the program start date and IFSA policy.
