Edinburgh Fringe Festival — Experiencing New Works, Solo Shows, & Experimental Theatre at an International Performing Arts Festival

MAS Arts Award Application | Kate Hovey, Drama Scholar Faculty Mentor: David Dalton

PROJECT SUMMARY

I am applying with scholar Abby Milne for a combined \$6,000 to travel in August to the Edinburgh Fringe Festival in Scotland. As a scholar of Drama, the opportunity to spend a week immersed in experimental theatre works and art exhibitions will expand my knowledge and appreciation for my field. In addition to my interest in acting, my creative projects are influenced by my love of music, visual art, and other forms of performance. The Fringe would give me the chance to engage with all of these fields—in one week, in one city.

The Arts Award funding would allow Abby and I to travel to and around Edinburgh, purchase tickets for shows, and cover food and lodging. After our six nights in Edinburgh, I plan to travel individually to London for two nights to see some West End shows. This portion of the trip will be entirely self-funded—I am only requesting that the grant cover expenses related to the Fringe.

PROPOSED PROJECT

Attending the Edinburgh Fringe Festival would be a once-in-a-lifetime experience for me as a multidisciplinary artist and scholar of Drama. At UVA, I have engaged with theatre as an actor, director, designer, critic, and audience member, and I am always seeking new ways to deepen my understanding of performance as an evolving art form. The Fringe's diversity of performances and artists would provide me with a unique opportunity to engage directly with a wide range of experimental theatre practices, many of which I would not otherwise have access to in the United States.

Over the past two years, I have been committed to exploring the intersections of art, technology, and performance. As a double major in Drama and Computer Science, I am particularly interested in the ways digital media can enhance or transform the theatrical experience. At the Fringe, I plan to pay close attention to how artists choose to engage with technology in their work. This will help me refine my own perspective as an artist and a scholar of theatre.

Another motivation for this experience comes from my involvement with student organizations on Grounds, most notably Shakespeare on the Lawn. I am passionate about making classical texts, such as Shakespeare's, feel accessible and alive for modern audiences. Directing the New Works show *Be a Doll* this spring confirmed my desire to continue directing in the future, likely

through Shakespeare on the Lawn. I believe that the performances I see at the Fringe will introduce me to bold approaches to storytelling that I can incorporate into my work at UVA.

The Arts Award grant would allow Abby and me to fully dive into the rich creativity of the Fringe without the financial burden of international travel. The support detailed in the budget section of this application will ensure that we are able to make the most of this unique opportunity. After our six nights in Edinburgh, I also plan to spend two nights in London—at my own personal expense—to watch West End productions and round out my experience with another iconic part of the UK's theatre scene.

Our faculty mentor, David Dalton, taught us both in Directing and continued to offer support as we each directed individual plays for the New Works festival. Due to his expertise, I know that he will be a great resource to explore ideas with upon our return next fall and can guide us towards how they can be implemented.

Ultimately, this trip aligns perfectly with my academic focus, creative goals, and commitment to the arts at UVA. It would be a huge step in my continued growth as a theatrical artist and would bring fresh energy and perspective to my work on Grounds.

INTERNATIONAL TRAVEL PREPARATION

Abby and I have both reached out to Hoos Abroad via email about logging our travel itinerary and taking the necessary first steps to set up our trip with the International Studies Office. We will each be meeting with a representative within the next few weeks.

FUTURE GOALS

I have loved the opportunities I've found at UVA for students to create and produce their own dramatic works. Although I have been primarily an actor for much of my artistic career, I have recently expanded into creative design and direction. Working as the director for the New Works show *Be a Doll* this spring solidified my desire to continue directing in the future, likely through Shakespeare on the Lawn. In addition to directing, I am interested in expanding into playwriting, with plans to take a course in it next year. Since I have two years left in my undergraduate career at UVA, I believe that now is the perfect time for me to experience the Fringe. By engaging with artists from around the world, I aim to bring back a richer, more globally informed perspective to my work at UVA. This opportunity feels like a natural next step in my development as a multidisciplinary theatre artist.

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ACADEMIC AND ARTISTIC PREPARATION:

During my two years at UVA, I have taken a very interdisciplinary approach to my study of Drama. I am a double major in Drama and Computer Science, and am interested in exploring the unexpected ways in which art and technology can combine. This was explored in Video Design and Sound Design, which were two courses I took in the Department of Drama that heavily incorporated digital practices into the artistic work. Other notable academic work includes Acting I and II, Directing, Studio Art, and involvement in the New Works production as both a performer and a director. During my time at The Fringe, I hope to pay special attention to how artists may choose to engage or not with technology in their work.

My artistic involvements also include the work I do with CIOs. I am heavily involved with Shakespeare on the Lawn, having acted in three shows, produced one, and am currently serving on the executive board for the club. Through this work, I have developed a deep love for the complexities and interpretive freedom of Shakespeare and classical theatre at large. I am always looking for new ways to make these texts feel alive for contemporary audiences, and I am certain that attending the Edinburgh Fringe Festival will expose me to a wide range of theatrical voices and styles that I can use in my work. Seeing how international artists reinterpret classical texts will allow me to infuse future productions with greater creativity, inclusivity, and innovation.

In the Miller Arts Scholars program, I have taken CASS 1010 and am currently enrolled in CASS 1011. I am also the marketing chair for the program. Surrounding myself with peers who are equally passionate about the arts has pushed me to grow not only as an artist, but also as a collaborator and leader. Attending the Edinburgh Fringe Festival would be a continuation of that commitment. I would treat this experience not just as an opportunity for personal artistic growth, but as a way to bring back new ideas and practices that will enrich the creative community at UVA.
