Attending the Jazz Education Network Conference

For my Fall 2019 minigrant project, I attended the Jazz Education Network (JEN) Conference in New Orleans, Louisiana from January 7th to January 10th. Through this opportunity I was able to gain valuable networking opportunities, attend specialized workshops, and learn much about current research in jazz and jazz education.

I mentioned in my proposal the potential for a travel grant to support this trip - unfortunately I was not eligible to apply due to the nature of the conference, so I followed the Plan A budget and timeline that relied solely on this minigrant. At the conference itself, I attended a wide variety of presentations and workshops that I found incredibly useful and interesting. I learned new ways to approach the emotion of jazz lyrics, the importance of social media and how to use it as a jazz musician, stylistic considerations when scatting on different types of songs, and new rehearsal techniques. I met many jazz players and teachers from around the world, and have already planned a performance with one this upcoming summer. I am very grateful to have had the opportunity to learn from jazz educators around the country and to broaden what I know about jazz music and practice.
